#### 1 Firestorm Story Tree



Located in the Mount Taylor Estate park between Ammon Place & Bolden Place off Sulwood Drive, Kambah.

#### 2 Kambah Sheep



Kambah Village Shopping Centre, Drakeford Drive & Marconi Crescent, Kambah.

#### 3 Moth Ascending the Capital



Drakeford Drive median at Summerland & O'Halloran Circuits, Kambah.

Artworks 4 to 7 are located around Lake Tuggeranong. Park near Libraries ACT and enjoy a relaxing lakeside walk as you explore this part of the Tuggeranong Public Art Trail.

S.A. Adair



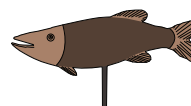

Andy Townsend



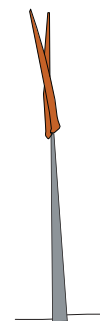

Standing 10 metres tall, this sculpture is across the Soward Way bridge on the other side of the lake. Can you see it? The sculpture's giant wings spin in the wind and make you feel like you could fly. The more wind there is, the faster the wings move. How fast are they going today?
